LOCAL PROCEDURES

TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE BAR:

PROPOSED ORDERS

At least two (2) business days prior to submitting a proposed order to the court reflecting the court's ruling, counsel directed to prepare the proposed order should submit the proposed order to opposing counsel for review. Opposing counsel should advise the drafting attorney of objections, if any, to the proposed order and attempt to resolve the issue giving rise to the objection.

Thereafter, the proposed order may be submitted to the court and should be accompanied by a cover letter, copied to opposing counsel, advising the court of whether or not opposing counsel has objections to the order. If advised that opposing counsel has objections, the court will not enter the order for at least 2 business days to allow opposing counsel to submit his/her proposed order reflecting the court's ruling.

*Only objections that the proposed order prepared by the drafting attorney do not accurately reflect the court's ruling are appropriate and counsel should not attempt to reargue the motion.*
