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ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER
NO. 9.1

With the ever-increasing caseload of both appellate and original proceedings filed in the Twentieth Judicial Circuit Courts, there has been a proliferation of motions filed. To provide for a careful yet expeditious handling of these motions, the Court has determined that it is appropriate to codify some of the Circuit's practices. It is hereby,

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED as follows:

1. The Court grants to Richard Callanan, Ex Officio Clerk, and, as he may authorize, to Staff Attorneys, the responsibility and authority to review and process all motions filed in accordance with the directives hereinafter given.

2. The Ex Officio Clerk and Staff Attorneys shall have the authority to dispose of the following administrative motions:

- a. Extensions of time;
- b. Oral argument;
- c. Expanded briefs;
- d. Consolidation of cases;
- e. Substitution of parties and attorneys; and,
- f. Supplementation of records.

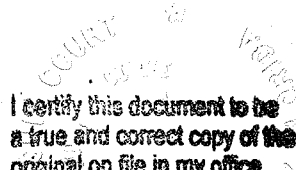
3. The Ex Officio Clerk and Staff Attorneys shall also have the authority to do the following:

- a. Issue sua sponte show cause orders;
- b. Order status reports on cases held in abeyance;
- c. Order responses to motions;
- d. Issue orders in criminal cases where an Anders brief has been filed; and,
- e. Issue mandates.
