

DISCUSSION

Open & Approval of Previous Minutes

Deputy Director Ashlee Whitewood, Lee County Probation

- Ashlee Whitewood called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m.
- All attendees introduced themselves and the agencies they represent.
- Meeting Minutes from November 28, 2023 deemed approved as proposed with no changes.

Item 1) <u>LCSO Jail Population Trends/Update</u> Lt. Jeremy Hardin, LCSO Sgt. Andreas Reisinger, LCSO

- Overall trend is increasing on the average daily population. The daily inmate population at the beginning of the year was as at an average of approximately 1600. Since February the population has increased, there has been a larger trend of more people coming in as to people going out.
- Additionally, discussions centered on the efforts aimed at removing the quarantine process as CDC guidelines evolve, aligning facility protocols accordingly.
- Furthermore, the impact of the Bond Schedule on inmate bonding rates was analyzed. It was noted that despite offering lower bonds, there has not been a significant change in the rate of inmates bonding out. The absence of a discernible upward or downward trend in bonding rates was observed.

Item 2) <u>LCSO Jail Inmate Program Updates and Statistics</u> (<u>Life Skills, RSAT, Re-entry, Peer Mentor Program, Work Release</u>) Lt. LaDonna Brady, Corrections Services

- RSAT Program- In 2023 we reviewed the outcomes of the program, noting that out of the 32 males who completed the program, 3 individuals reoffended. This resulted in a recidivism rate of 9.37%, indicating a relatively low rate of reoffending among program participants. Furthermore, the success rate of the program was highlighted, with 98.4% of participants considered successful based on their completion without reoffending. After reviewing the performance of female participants in the program, noting that out of the 15 females who completed it, one individual reoffended. This resulted in a success rate of 93.34% among female participants. In addition, the overall recidivism rate for all participants who completed the program was calculated at 8.51%, showing a decrease of 2.39% compared to the rate in 2022. This improvement resulted in a 91.49% recidivism rate overall. Currently our numbers for enrollment are 46 males and 36 females.
- Life Skills Program- Five males have completed the program with one reoffending resulting in an 80% success rate. Four females have completed the program with zero reoffending resulting in a 100% success rate. Overall, the recidivism rate for the Life Skills Program is 90%. Currently there are 46 males enrolled within the program.
- Veteran's Program- After reviewing the progress of the Veterans Program since its inception approximately 18 months ago. It was noted that two inmates have successfully graduated from the program during this period, and neither of them have returned to custody, resulting in a notable 100% success rate in terms of recidivism among program graduates. On top of that, the current enrollment status of the program was discussed, with nine inmates currently participating. The group acknowledged the importance of continuing to support and expand the program to effectively address the unique needs of incarcerated veterans.

- Work Release Program- Attendees discussed the outcomes of the Work Release Program, noting that out of the 21 inmates who participated, 18 successfully completed the program, resulting in a commendable success rate of 90.48%. However, it was reported that two individuals were rearrested after program completion. In addition, it was highlighted that three inmates were removed from the program for various reasons. Two of them were removed due to misconduct, while one was removed because they were not satisfied with the type of work offered through the program.
- Re-entry Programs- The attendees reviewed the comprehensive support services provided to inmates in 2023. Noteworthy achievements included conducting over a thousand interviews to assess inmate needs, processing a substantial number of program applications, and facilitating the issuance of essential documents such as driver's licenses, birth certificates, and social security cards to aid in the reintegration process. On top of that, the challenges encountered in securing transportation resources, particularly in acquiring donated bikes, were discussed. Efforts to overcome these challenges and improve transportation support for inmates were explored.

The meeting provided an overview of the inmate support services activities in 2023, highlighting the following key statistics:

o Provided seven bikes to inmates as a startup transportation initiative due to difficulties in sourcing donated bikes.

Item 3) <u>LCSO Corrections Day Work Program Updates and Statistics</u> Jeannette Defaira, Corrections Day Work Program Coordinator

Attendees discussed the status of the LCSO Corrections Day Work Program, noting the significant
enrollment of 50 inmates and the financial savings generated for the county, both at the beginning of the
year and through non-incarceration alternatives. The completion rate of 53% was acknowledged, with
46 inmates still actively participating in the program. Furthermore, discussions centered on the
importance of ongoing recruitment efforts to maximize program utilization and engagement. The
collaboration with non-profit organizations within the county were highlighted as a mutually beneficial
opportunity, emphasizing the potential for additional support and resources to enhance program
effectiveness.

The meeting provided an update on the LCSO Corrections Day Work Program, highlighting the following key points:

• County Dollars Saved:

o Beginning of the Year: \$68,698

o Non-incarceration Savings: \$100,444.92

• Judges can court order attendance for once a week.

Item 4) <u>AOC Treatment Court Programs End of Year Information Updates</u> Bridget Washburn, AOC Treatment Courts Manager

- The recent addition of Honorable Judge Nicole Mirra to the team was discussed, highlighting her positive contributions thus far under the mentorship of Honorable Judge Josephine Gagliardi. The current participant numbers in each problem-solving court were reviewed, highlighting the ongoing demand for these specialized programs.
- Moreover, discussions centered on the recent approval of certification standards for problem-solving
 courts by the Supreme Court of Florida, along with the proposal to participate in the Pilot Project for
 implementing these standards. The development of a secondary track within Drug Court to
 accommodate moderate-risk/high-need offenders was also explored as a means to expand program
 eligibility.
- Among other things, the team's involvement in community events such as the NAMI Walk and Veteran
 Expo was highlighted, along with plans to participate in various awareness months in May, emphasizing
 the importance of volunteer and speaker engagement.

The meeting provided an update on various initiatives related to problem-solving courts and collaborative efforts, including the following key points:

- Current Participant Numbers:
 - o Drug Court: 99 participants
 - o Mental Health Court: 32 participants
 - Veterans Treatment Court: 21 participants
- Approval of Certification Standards for Problem Solving Courts by the Supreme Court of Florida.
- Development of Secondary Track within Drug Court for Moderate Risk/High Need Offenders.
- Recognition of Various Awareness Months in May; National Treatment Courts Month, Florida Problem Solving Courts Month, National Mental Health Awareness Month, National Military Appreciation Month and Florida Courts Opioids and Stimulants use awareness Month.

Item 5) <u>Statewide Bond Schedule Update</u>

Amy Kinsey, Criminal Division Director of County Probation and Pretrial Services

- Attendees discussed the transition to the Statewide Bond Schedule following its adoption by Chief Judge Porter, with additional considerations outlined in Administrative Order 3.9 specific to Lee County. Notable changes were highlighted, including automatic holds for individuals with prior failure to appear instances and a reevaluation of bond eligibility for certain offenses such as, 1st Degree Felonies or being arrested 3 times or more within 6 months.
- Amongst other things, discussions centered on the impact of these changes on pre-first appearance release rates, noting a marginal increase from 80% to 81% based on January statistics. It was acknowledged that the continued monitoring and evaluation was needed to assess the long-term effects of the new bond schedule on the judicial process and public safety.

The meeting provided an update on the implementation of the Statewide Bond Schedule and Administrative Order 3.9, highlighting the following key points:

- Adoption of Statewide bond schedule by Chief Judge Porter, effective January 1, 2024.
- o Additional factors considered under Administrative Order 3.9 in Lee County.
- o Impact of the new bond schedule on pre-first appearance release and bond conditions.
- o Observations from January statistics indicating a minimal change in release rates.

Item 6) <u>Human and Veteran Services Opioid Abatement programs</u> Tara Martinson, Grants Analyst-Behavioral Health

Item 7) <u>The Empowerment Center / Triage Facility Update</u> Heather Cross, Chief Executive Officer

- The empowerment centers last day of operation in that building will be March 31, 2024. Stopped taking intakes since February due to the unsafe conditions of the building.
- Collaborating with Catholic Charities and Salvation Army to transition the homeless that were in the shelter out to other areas of the community.
- 17 people are in the Rapid Rehousing Program and Salvation Army opened up some offices, which allowed 24 people to go over there.
- Trying to keep as much programming through the Salvation Army as possible.
- There is no long-term plan as to reopening the Empowerment Center. They are looking at areas around North Fort Myers.
